Policy guidance for Zero Hunger

Zero Hunger is one of the greatest challenges of our time. Achieving it by 2030 requires immediate action on a number of fronts: coherent policies and programmes, increased investments in line with national priorities and greater collaboration across different sectors and stakeholders.

To respond to this pressing need, **FAO and the European Union have developed a new series of Policy Guidance Notes that will prepare policy advisors and decision-makers to effectively influence the policy agenda in support of Zero Hunger.**

The series is developed within the framework of the “Food and Nutrition Security Impact, Resilience, Sustainability and Transformation” (FIRST) programme and provides policy makers with a step-by-step path to understand:

1. The direct and indirect impact that policies have on the causes of hunger, food insecurity and malnutrition.
2. How to best coordinate the formulation and implementation of policies to improve their impact on the eradication of hunger, food insecurity and malnutrition.
