Why is it important?

outh represent more than half of the population of Liberia and can play a critical role in the future of agriculture, however they need support to unlock their potential. Empowering Liberian youth to invest in agriculture and food systems is key to achieving sustainable food security, reducing youth unemployment, combating distress migration, and making agriculture more efficient, sustainable and resilient.

econd, youth can be agents of change in the transformation of food systems. Agricultural production systems need to become more productive and resilient to shocks, adapting to climate change and the degradation of natural resources. Simultaneously, the agricultural sector in Liberia is based on subsistence farming characterized by low yields and scarce use of technology. By harnessing innovation, utilizing new technologies and techniques, and taking

advantage of new opportunities in emerging value chains, young agri-entrepreneurs can create thriving businesses and enhance the value add of agricultural production.

inally, attracting and retaining youth in agriculture is key to reducing unemployment and

distress migration. Informal employment affects nearly nine out of ten young workers in Liberia, and close to half of all workers aged 15 to 24 are poor in spite of being employed. Underemployment fuels rural-urban and international migration, as many rural youths leave their homes in search of a better future.
