**TENTH MEETING OF THE *AD HOC* ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON THE FUNDING  
STRATEGY AND RESOURCE MOBILIZATION**

**Rome, Italy, 5-7 September 2018**

**REPORT**

**ITEM I. OPENING OF THE MEETING**

1. The tenth meeting of the *Ad Hoc* Advisory Committee on the Funding Strategy and Resource Mobilization was opened by Mr. Kent Nnadozie, Secretary of the Treaty. He recalled Resolution 3/2017 by which the Governing Body decided to reconvene the *Ad Hoc* Advisory Committee on the Funding Strategy (the Committee), in order to update the Funding Strategy for consideration of the Eighth Session of the Governing Body. He emphasized the critical role that the Funding Strategy plays in ensuring that financial resources are made available for implementation of the International Treaty and wished the Committee a productive week.

**ITEM II. ELECTION OF THE CO-CHAIRS**

2. The Secretary informed the Committee that Mr Pierre du Plessis (Namibia) would be stepping down as the Co-Chair and thanked him for his support and the very constructive guidance he provided during his tenure. Members also expressed their appreciation for his invaluable contributions, and hoped that he would continue to contribute his knowledge and expertise, to the extent possible, to the work of the Committee.

3. The Committee elected Mr. Yacoob Mungroo (Mauritius) as the new Co-Chair to work with Mr. Alwin Kopse (Switzerland) as the Co-Chair of the Committee.

**ITEM III. ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA AND TIMETABLE**

4. The Committee adopted its Agenda as provided in *Appendix 1*. The list of participants of the meeting is contained in *Appendix 2*.

5. The Co-Chairs invited the Co-Chair of the *Ad Hoc* Opened-ended Working Group to Enhance the Functioning of the Multilateral System of Access and Benefit-sharing (Working Group), Mr Javad Mozafari, to provide an update on the work of the Working Group, particularly on issues of relevance to the work of the Committee. Mr Mozafari highlighted the interlinkages between the mandates of the two groups and noted that, for instance, a target for the Benefit-sharing Fund needed to be set in order to facilitate progress in the work of the Working Group. The importance of synchronizing the scheduling of their respective meetings was also noted.

#### ITEM IV. UPDATED FUNDING STRATEGY AND RELATED ANNEXES

6. The Secretariat provided an overview of the Annotated Outline of the Updated Funding Strategy (Annotated Outline) and its related annexes, noting that Sections I – III were already very detailed but that other sections still needed to be further elaborated, including the Annexes. The Annotated Outline also contained a Results Framework (Appendix 1 of the Annotated Outline) and a Matrix of Funding Tools and the Areas and Programmes under the International Treaty.
7. The Committee made a number of recommendations on the further development of the Funding Strategy and requested the Secretariat to provide a complete draft of the text of the Funding Strategy and its annexes at the next meeting of the Committee.
8. The Committee reviewed the Results Framework of the *Annotated Outline: Funding Strategy*, as contained in Appendix 3 to this Report. It requested the Secretary to add an accompanying explanatory text to paragraph 18 of the Annotated Outline of the Funding Strategy, to further demonstrate how the implementation of the Treaty contributes to the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its targets.
9. The Secretariat gave a presentation on the progress made towards populating the Matrix. It emphasized that the Matrix provides a first provisional snapshot of funding flows to the areas of the Treaty and that it should be improved through an iterative process to build greater awareness of the various funding tools contributing to the implementation of the International Treaty. The Committee emphasized that the Matrix is a strategic tool to enable the Governing Body to understand which funding tools are supporting financially the different Areas and Programmes of the International Treaty and to identify opportunities for building cooperation and synergies. It recommended that further work was needed to enhance the Matrix further and make it more useful to the Governing Body. Specifically, the Committee recommended:
  - a. That further work should be undertaken on the Matrix using the revised Matrix format contained in the document *Provisionally Populated Matrix of Funding Tools*.
  - b. That the Matrix should be complemented by the provision of an accompanying report, such as the *Report on Progress: Funding Strategy Matrix of Funding Tools*. The Report will provide an analysis of each funding tool described in the Matrix, including concerning any needs assessment carried out that is of relevance to the Treaty, and opportunities for future cooperation with each funding tool. The Report will also contain a tool for further analysis such as the network analytical tools described in the recommendations of the document *Report on Progress: Funding Strategy Matrix of Funding Tools*.
  - c. That further work should be undertaken to provide more clarity on the categories listed under the Areas and Programmes of the International Treaty, contained in the Matrix.
  - d. That the issue of double-counting might be addressed through the provision of further clarity on the Matrix categories and through enhancing the guidance provided in the collection of information to help to eliminate or avoid duplication.
  - e. To reissue the Notification on the request for information on bilateral programmes and funding for National and Regional PGRFA activities.
  - f. In the longer-term to consider how the national reporting format for Treaty Contracting Parties might be expanded to provide more streamlined information.
10. The Secretariat introduced the document, *Funding Strategy Target Setting: Methodology Options (Methodology Options)* on the options for setting targets for the overall Funding Strategy and the Benefit-sharing Fund.

11. The Committee made the following recommendations to the Secretariat regarding the overall target of the Funding Strategy:
- a. Undertake the “Cost-based” methodology described in the document *Methodology Options* to estimate the costs related to the implementation of the Treaty, in particular to meet the needs for implementation of the Second Global Plan of Action. The “Cost-based” methodology should be complemented with the information arising from the Funding Tools listed in the Matrix, drawing upon existing needs assessments of relevance to the International Treaty. The methodology should take into account the need to implement the International Treaty to support the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals and climate change action. The objective of the exercise would be to improve understanding of total cost of needs and the financial gap.
  - b. Clarify the limitations of the overall methodology, with the understanding that it would be an initial step in the process.
  - c. Explore the possibility of undertaking an analysis on Cost of Inaction that could be used in future communication and awareness related to the Treaty’s Funding Strategy, building on previous research available.
  - d. Explore the possibility to derive regional targets from this exercise.
  - e. Make information available about how the costings of the Priority Activities of the Global Plan of Action for Plant Genetic Resources for Food and Agriculture (GPA) have been calculated to the Committee, for further guidance, well in advance of the next ACFSRM meeting.
  - f. Further develop the methodologies for calculating the target of the overall Funding Strategy and share them with the Committee for further guidance and agreement at a check-point that would allow sufficient time for the calculation of the target so that it could be discussed at the respective meetings of the Committee and the Working Group, in early 2019. The mode and timing of the check-point meeting to review the updated methodologies will be advised by the Committee, at a later time.
12. The Committee recommended that the timeframe for the overall target for the Funding Strategy should align with that of the Funding Strategy, which it recommended to cover a 5-year period.
13. For the target on the Benefit-sharing Fund, the Committee recommended to follow an integrated approach of employing, in parallel, two methodologies to arrive at a target, one being the needs-based modular approach and the other the supply-based methodology option. The needs-based modular approach considers the relevant GPA priorities, and the supply-based methodology option calculates the costs of a selection of activities within those priorities that the Benefit-sharing Fund could make a strategic contribution to.
14. The Committee requested the Secretariat to:
- a) Further develop the supply-based methodology to incorporate:
    - i. voluntary contributions to the BSF over the past five years;
    - ii. realistic contributions from users and of anticipated user-based payments;
    - iii. additional voluntary contributions from enabling partners, including the food processing industry.
  - b) Submit the further developed methodologies for calculating the funding target of the Benefit-sharing Fund together with those of the overall Funding Strategy at the check-point established by the Committee as referred to in paragraph 11f.

15. The Committee emphasized the need to articulate the importance for the Governing Body to define Priorities within the updated Funding Strategy in section III (Enabling Treaty Implementation through a Funding Strategy: Programmatic Approach) and section IV (Programmatic Approach and the Instruments under the direct control of the Governing Body).

16. The Committee reviewed the document *Annotated Annexes to the Annotated Outline of the Updated Funding Strategy* and provided a number of recommendations to the Secretariat to be incorporated in their further development:

- a) Annex I – Operations Manual: Fund for Agreed Purposes
  - i. The importance of reporting to the Governing Body and aligning its operations with the overall programmatic approach of the Funding Strategy.
- b) Annex II – Operations Manual: Benefit-sharing Fund
  - i. The Resource Mobilization section should start by making clear the funding sources for the Benefit-sharing Fund. It should recognize the paramount importance of the user-based income arising from the enhanced Multilateral System. Other funding sources will be voluntary contributions from Contracting Parties, Philanthropic Organizations and the private sector, including the Food Processing Industry.
  - ii. Make clear that, as specified in 19.3.f of the International Treaty, the Benefit-sharing Fund is the mechanism established by the Governing Body for receiving and utilizing the financial resources that will accrue from the Multilateral System.
  - iii. The user-based income arising from the Multilateral System and deposited within the Benefit-sharing Fund would not be earmarked.
  - iv. The resource mobilization manual will emphasize that priority would be given to un-earmarked voluntary contributions. Earmarked voluntary contributions will be acceptable but will be kept under regular review given the implications of such earmarking, to ensure that there are no adverse effects on the Fund. The effects of earmarking on the allocation of un-earmarked funds requires further discussion.
  - v. The resource mobilization manual will include relevant aspects of the previous Strategic Plan.
  - vi. The procedures for development and approval of projects and programmes were informed by the existing procedures and reflect the lessons learnt and recommendations made from previous project cycles. The procedures should establish clear linkages with the programmatic approach of the Funding Strategy to enable the Benefit-sharing Fund to fill gaps identified. The responsibilities and steps for the project development and approval should be clearly identified for their review by the Committee, at its next meeting.
  - vii. The Monitoring and Evaluation Framework section should link the storyline and theory of change for the Benefit-sharing Fund with the targets and indicators established to enable the monitoring and evaluation of projects and programmes. These should enable that lessons learned and continuous learning are regularly provided to all Regions so that they will be committed to the Fund.

- c) Annex III - Additional Information on implementation, monitoring and review.
- i. The Committee agreed that there is a need to keep the Governing Body updated on a regular basis on the progress in the implementation of the Funding Strategy, and that the comprehensive review of the Funding Strategy should be carried out after a 5-year period.
  - ii. The timing of the implementation, monitoring and review should be specified in this Annex.

**ITEM V. ADVISE ON RESOURCE MOBILIZATION EFFORTS AND ON LEVERAGING FUNDING AND DEVELOPING SYNERGIES BETWEEN DIFFERENT FUNDING SOURCES AND PARTNERS DURING THE BIENNIUM**

17. The Secretariat gave a presentation on specific areas where guidance was sought on resource mobilization, leveraging funding and developing synergies between different funding sources and partners.
18. The Committee made the following recommendations:
- a. Invites the Secretariat to provide information to the Treaty National Focal Points (NFPs) about the relevant focal points of the GCF, the Adaptation Fund and the GEF, on the opportunities for engaging in the Readiness and Preparatory Support Programme of the GCF, the Readiness Programme for Climate Finance of the Adaptation Fund and the usefulness of the World Bank Group Climate Smart Agricultural donor tool.
  - b. Supports the suggestion of the Panel of Experts to consider providing a certificate of excellence for the best proposals to the Benefit-sharing Fund that were not able to be funded.
  - c. Recommends that the Secretary liaise with relevant partners, including FAO, UNEP, UNDP, IFAD, GCDT, the WBG, Commitment 2 “Protecting Land and Water Against Climate Change” of the One Planet Summit, the private sector and philanthropic organisations, to explore how they might be able to support the Fourth Call for Proposals (CFP4) accessing climate finance programmes and funds and to present to the Eighth Session of the Governing Body pilot models, funding partnerships and ways of mobilising support from climate finance mechanisms.
  - d. Advises the Secretariat to continue to seek means of collaboration within FAO, and recommends to the Governing Body that FAO is invited to consider including the Treaty, in its climate finance activities, such as the development and implementation of its climate finance projects, and its activities within GCF, the GEF and any other relevant activities. And to further consider how the Treaty’s contribution to the aims of the GCF might be promoted more widely in the GCF family.
  - e. Recommends that the Governing Body consider supporting the establishment of the focal point/helpdesk to, *inter alia*, notify Treaty NFPs of upcoming opportunities, develop a network of climate finance partners and expertise for NFPs, liaise with the key partners in climate finance and provide links to expertise to develop proposals.

- f. Recommends that the Secretariat prioritize relationship building with philanthropic organizations and networks.
- g. Recommends that the Secretariat explore the notion of the “cost of inaction” as a possible tool for communication for policy-makers and donors.
- h. Recommends that the Secretariat consider approaching the Food Processing industries in collaboration with the Crop Trust and in line with Article 13.6 of the International Treaty, which states that Contracting Parties shall consider modalities of a strategy of voluntary benefit-sharing contributions whereby Food Processing Industries that benefit from plant genetic resources for food and agriculture shall contribute to the Multilateral System.

#### **ITEM VI. COMMUNICATION AND VISIBILITY OF FUNDING TOOLS IN SUPPORT OF THE INTERNATIONAL TREATY DURING THE BIENNIUM**

19. The Secretary provided an update on the activities undertaken to continue the work on communication and visibility since the Seventh Session of the Governing Body.
20. The Committee expressed its appreciation for the efforts made by Secretary and emphasized the importance of continuing the work on communication, recognizing its crucial role in enhancing funding for and giving visibility to the Funding Tools of the Funding Strategy.

#### **ITEM VII. DELIVERY OF NON-MONETARY BENEFIT-SHARING THROUGH THE FUNDING STRATEGY**

21. The Committee recognised the importance of non-monetary benefit-sharing as an element of the Funding Strategy and programmatic approach, and suggested non-monetary benefit-sharing is further integrated into the Funding Strategy through elaborating links with the Funding Strategy and how to promote its delivery.
22. The Committee requested the Secretariat to produce a list of non-monetary benefit-sharing, guided by the relevant sections of the Treaty, and to consider using an economic study to cost out its elements.

#### **ITEM VIII. DRAFT TERMS OF REFERENCE FOR A POTENTIAL STANDING COMMITTEE ON THE FUNDING STRATEGY AND RESOURCE MOBILIZATION**

23. The Committee requested that the Secretariat develop a draft of the Terms of Reference for a potential Standing Committee for the consideration of the Committee at its next meeting.
24. It recommended that the existing Terms of Reference for the Committee could be used as a basis, with consideration given to the longer-term nature of the work of the Standing Committee. It also made the following recommendations for inclusion:

- a. It recalled the basis for proposing a Standing Committee was linked to the programmatic approach and the need for regular review of the Funding Strategy, and recommended this notion is reflected in the rationale of the Standing Committee Terms of Reference document.
- b. The Committee recommended that the Standing Committee use a staggered membership model to ensure continuity.
- c. Consideration should be given to the participation of entities that are funding tools of the Funding Strategy and other Treaty stakeholders as observers or experts.

#### **ITEM IX. DATE AND PLACE OF THE ELEVENTH MEETING OF THE COMMITTEE**

25. The Committee requested the Co-Chairs to work in close coordination with the Secretariat and with the Co-Chairs of the Ad Hoc Opened-ended Working Group to Enhance the Functioning of the Multilateral System of Access and Benefit-sharing, to establish a date for the next meeting given the interlinkages between the Committee and the Working Group and the timeframe of the Eighth Session of the Governing Body.

#### **ITEM X. OTHER BUSINESS**

26. The Committee did not consider any other business.

#### **XI. ADOPTION OF THE REPORT**

27. The Committee adopted the report of the Tenth Meeting.
